In Washington, DC and Across California, Workers & Community Supporters Turn Up the Heat!

DAY OF ACTION ACROSS THE NATION SHOWS UC WE ARE NOT BACKING DOWN

JUNE 4, 2008

• Washington DC: More than 100 members from AFSCME DC, UC Alums, and the AFL-CIO picketed in front of UC-DC offices. A delegation was sent in and led by Board Member Margaret Konjevod, who flew all the way from LA, demanding the 20,000 UC workers contract get settled!



• Davis: Sen. Darryl Steinberg's Chief of Staff and more than 100 workers delegated and toughly questioned UCDMC CEO before she abruptly walked out of the meeting. Later **an evening vigil was held in** front of the Chancellor's house and dozens of post-it notes were left on his door saying: "We will fight until we win," and "We will be back!"

• LA: Several hundred workers and students engaged in pickets, marches and delegations. More than 20 students and workers began a 3-day fast in support of a fair contract, with support from religious leaders. Patrick Mitchell, fasting bargaining team member, and the others are camping out in front of the Chancellors house, demanding he support the UC minimum wage and a fair contract. More than 1,000 signatures were delivered to the Chancellor, supporting Bill Clinton's decision not to speak at commencement unless we have an agreement.



• **Riverside:** More than 100 workers and students marched and **briefly took over the Administration Building** sitting down and chanting for a fair contract!

• San Diego: 400 workers and supporters picketed on campus and did multiple delegations to campus officials demanding a fair contract. Medical Center workers met with the CEO for nearly an hour demanding his support for fair contract, and were supported by nurses and faith leaders.

• Irvine: Over 250 workers and students picketed, and then marched on the CEO & Chancellor, delivering a petition for a fair contract!

• Santa Barbara: A delegation forced a Vice Chancellor to address over 200 workers and students picketing outside of the Administration Building.

• San Francisco: Members' calls flooded the phone of the CEO all day, assuring him we aren't going to stop until we get a fair deal! Later, more than 40 members sent the same strong message by marching in and chanting at the Chancellor's office.





•Berkeley: Thursday, roughly 100 workers and supporters shocked the Administration by sneaking into the Chancellor's all-staff "chat." Workers unfurled banners while bargaining team member Kathryn Lybarger seized the mic to lead an action that took over the chat and put the Chancellor on the spot forcing him to listen to our demands for a fair contract.

• Santa Cruz: Picketing everyday this week, hundreds of members and students gear up for a full day of action on Friday during the inauguration activities of their new Chancellor.
